- A. Diagram
- B. Pie chart
- C. Bar graph

Numerous robotic missions to Mars have revealed tantalizing evidence of a planet that may once have been capable of supporting life.


- 2. Imagine this sentence is a supporting detail in a well-developed paragraph. Which of the following sentences would best function as a topic sentence?

- B. The CDC has a .gov web address.

- D. The CDC is also listed as a source consulted.
- 9. What could a skeptical reader do to verify the facts on the infographic?
- A. Interview one teenager to ask about his or her screen time.
- B. Follow the links for the sources and determine their credibility.
- C. Check a tertiary source like Wikipedia to verify the information.
- D. Find different values for screen time on someone's personal blog.

## **Answer Key**

- 1. A. A diagram illustrates complex visual ideas, so it could show which part of a bicycle is which and how they fit together. See Lesson: Summarizing Text and Using Text Features.
- 2. B. The sentence above conveys factual information about Mars in an excited tone that suggests a positive interest in the subject. This makes it most likely to fit into an informational paragraph sharing facts about Mars. See Lesson: Main Ideas, Topic Sentences, and Supporting Details.
- 3. D. If the above sentence were a topic sentence, its supporting details



would likely share information to develop the idea that Mars may have supported life in the past. See Lesson: Main Ideas, Topic Sentences, and Supporting Details.

- 4. C. The sentence above could act as an example to show how space discoveries teach us about Earth and ourselves. See Lesson: Main Ideas, Topic Sentences, and Supporting Details.
- 5. C. Larger bars in a bar graph indicate higher numbers. This book has sold more paperback copies than any other. See Lesson: Summarizing Text and Using Text Features.
- 6. B. The bar graph shows fewer hardcover sales than any other kind. This could help support an argument that later books should only be released in electronic and paperback forms. See Lesson: Summarizing Text and Using Text Features.
- 7. D. It is usually a good sign if an author is clearly named in a source. Although this source is authored by an organization, the CDC, instead of a single author, there are many other signs it is credible. See Lesson: Understanding Primary Sources, Making Inferences, and Drawing Conclusions.
- 8. B. When presenting this type of information, a government organization with a .gov web address is typically considered a reputable source. See Lesson: Understanding Primary Sources, Making Inferences, and Drawing Conclusions.
- 9. B. One way to verify facts is to check the sources an author used. Verifying facts elsewhere may also be a good idea, but it is important to use reputable primary or secondary sources. See Lesson: Understanding Primary Sources, Making Inferences, and Drawing Conclusions.
