2. B. Writing a postcard. It is an informal mode of communication between close friends and relatives. See Lesson: Formal and Informal Language.

3. D. *I appreciate you bringing this issue to my attention.* The sentence uses the most formal and polite vocabulary. See Lesson: Formal and Informal Language.



4. C. This passage ironically is a humorous description of a toddler's emotions, written by an adult who has enough experience to know that a toddler's huge emotions will pass. **See Lesson: Tone and Mood, Transition Words.**

5. B. Authors use irony when their words do not literally mean what they say. The joy does not really go out of the world when a toddler loses her binky—but it may seem that way to the child. **See Lesson: Tone, Mood, and Transition Words.**

6. B. This passage establishes irony in the opening sentence by applying the superlative phrase "the most amazing thing ever" to an ordinary occurrence. **See Lesson: Tone, Mood, and Transition Words.**
